

Ron Grahame



Ron Grahame was sitting four rows behind us at the DU hockey game and I had the pleasure to chat with Ron between the second and third periods. I told him I was just a freshman back in 1972 (Ron's senior year at DU) and was fortunate to get student season hockey tickets. The seats were in the next to last row directly behind the goalie. The goalie was Ron Grahame. In April of 1973, DU went to the NCAA Championship series (Frozen Four) in Boston. It was during spring break and I drove with Bobby Susser from New Jersey to Boston. We stayed with Richie Nadler, a fraternity brother who lived in Needham, a suburb of Boston and went all went to the Boston Garden to watch DU play Boston College in the semigame. We won the first game 10-4 and were in the finals. In the NCAA championship game, Rob Palmer, our #1 center on DU's highest scoring line with Pete McNab and Rich 'Sarge' Preston was injured. Ron Grahame kept us in the game but we lost 3-2 to Wisconsin.

After a collegiate career with the University of Denver during which Ron Grahame was named a First Team All-American, Grahame was signed by the Houston Aeros of the WHA. He played a season for the minor league Macon Whoopees in 1973 before coming up to the Aeros at the end of the season. In the 1974–75 season he made the Aeros for good, leading the WHA in wins, shutouts and goals against

average and backstopping the club to the AVCO World Trophy, winning both the Ben Hatskin Trophy for best goaltender, First Team All-Star accolades and the WHA Playoff MVP. His following two seasons saw an equal degree of success, including a Second Team All-Star berth in 1976 and a second Hatskin award in 1977.

He became a free agent after the 1977 season and signed with the NHL's Boston Bruins for the 1977–78 NHL season. He continued his starring play, having a fine season as the Bruins' number one goaltender. After that season, however, he was traded to the Los Angeles Kings for a first-round draft pick in the 1979 draft (which turned into Ray Bourque), and played poorly thereafter. He served with the Kings for three seasons before being sold to the Quebec Nordiques in December, 1980. He played eight games for the Nordiques before being sent down to the minors for the remainder of the season, after which he retired

POST-PLAYING CAREER

After retiring, Ron Grahame worked as the athletic director at the University of Denver, where he worked with the hockey team. He also conducted goalie clinics for ice hockey and inline hockey goaltenders

In 2007 Grahame began his second year as Senior Associate Athletics Director, and his 14th year as an administrator at the University of Denver. He was responsible for the overall supervision of all 17 varsity sport programs at Denver.

Grahame graduated from the University of Denver in 1973 with a B.A. in physical education and was one of the most successful hockey players in school history. After retiring from playing, he returned to Denver as an assistant coach from 1982 to 1989.

Ron and his wife Charlotte have two sons, John, an NHL goaltender who won the Stanley Cup in 2004 with the Tampa Bay Lightning, and Jason, who graduated from the University of Denver in 2003 and now lives in Vancouver. Ron and Charlotte reside in Denver. Charlotte and John are the only mother/son combination to have their names engraved on the Stanley Cup (Charlotte was a member of the Colorado Avalanche executive management during their 2001 Stanley Cup season).







Peter McNab, longtime Avalanche broadcaster and former DU star, dies at 70: "Father of Colorado hockey"

McNab had a 14-year NHL career and went on to call Avs games for 25 years after the team's move to Colorado.

Peter McNab carried a notebook. He scribbled his observations during Avalanche games while providing color commentary for the live broadcast. He researched his own statistics and jotted them in the notebook before games. Altitude TV has people who find stats to prep the on-air talent. But McNab kept his findings a secret.

"It was sort of his bible," said Nuggets broadcaster Vic Lombardi, who sometimes anchors Avalanche coverage from the studio. "We all got information: 'Here's what to look for tonight. Here are the trends.' But then we all knew, Peter's got his own stuff. He would tell us, 'Wait until you hear this tonight.' He

would never share it until we were on the air. It was the coolest thing." McNab, the Colorado Avalanche's longtime analyst for Altitude TV, has died, the team announced Sunday. He was 70.

Admired by colleagues for his encyclopedic knowledge and steady, reliable presence even in the face of cancer, McNab called Avalanche games for 26 years, spanning the franchise's entire existence in Denver. He was beloved by hockey fans in Colorado for the passionate and honest analysis he brought to broadcasts.

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But McNab's own career blossomed in Denver. He was a standout forward for the University of Denver, where he landed on NHL radars and was drafted by the Buffalo Sabres in 1972. It was the start of a 14-year NHL career in which he scored 363 goals and tallied 813 points playing for the Sabres, Boston Bruins, Vancouver Canucks and New Jersey Devils, where his father was the general manager.

In three seasons at DU (1970-73), McNab compiled 170 career points, still ranking 10th in program history. He led the Pioneers to a national runner-up finish with 32 goals in his final college season. "Peter was a great storyteller of the game and had an incredible

ability to connect viewers and fans with not only what was happening on the ice but the history of the sport as well," DU coach David Carle said in a statement.

McNab's television career started in New Jersey, where he called Devils games for eight seasons. When the Quebec Nordiques relocated to Denver and became the Colorado Avalanche, he joined the booth. His first year calling Avs games was a dream season. The city's new team won the 1996 Stanley Cup, led by stars such as Peter Forsberg, Patrick Roy and Joe Sakic, who is now the Avalanche's president of hockey operations.

"(McNab) was a staple in the local hockey community, going back to his years playing at the University of Denver to working

nearly 30 years with the Avs," Sakic said in a statement. "But as good as a hockey man as he was, he will be most remembered for being a friend to so many."


Including the players, who McNab made an effort to know personally.

"He's a special guy. He would always come and sit beside me in my stall at the practice rink, and we would just talk about what was going on, talk about stuff in the league," former Avalanche forward Matt Duchene said. "I always enjoyed our talks. After his career, you could tell he still wanted to be part of hockey because he loved it so much. I've always really enjoyed meeting people like that."

Those relationships were evident in June after the Avs won their third Stanley Cup. As the team celebrated, McNab described the scene from the ice in Tampa. Lombardi and Altitude's live audience watched as Avalanche captain Gabriel Landeskog skated over and put his arm around McNab, ready to give an interview.

Like the broadcaster's first year in Colorado, his last full season also ended in a championship.

A fraternity bond of 50-plus years: 'I never envisioned that this would go beyond graduation'

The American University ZBT brothers helped save one brother's business, chipped in to buy a car for another and created a scholarship for students in need.

The American University fraternity brothers, now in their 70s and 80s, returned to campus last weekend — their hair mostly gray, if they had any left at all. They each carried emotional battle scars from decades of life.

Of the original 200 Zeta Beta Tau members in the group, about 170 are still alive. They marveled at being back in the place they met when they were barely men.

The university's president, Sylvia M. Burwell, welcomed the group back to campus Oct. 15 and was struck by the gravity of the reunion.

"I am thrilled," Burwell said, holding back tears, "to see you all, and how you stay together."

The group, made up of men who graduated from American University between 1960 and 1972, have punctuated the longevity of their friendship with acts of giving. They helped save a brother's business that was going under, chipped in to buy a car for another member who was down on

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his luck, created a scholarship at the university for students in need and raised money for a school in Ecuador. They have also stood by one another through turmoil and triumphs.

"This group is special," Burwell said in an interview with The Washington Post. "ZBT helped set the culture of what these organizations should be. They are about community, and a group of people that support each other."

When it comes to Greek life, she continued, "I believe this is the example."

David Kanter, 80, founded the Beta Psi chapter of ZBT at American University in 1961 and was the fraternity's first president.

"I never envisioned that this would go beyond graduation into a group that would stick together and take care of each other," he said. "Fraternities are not all about exclusivity and drinking and partying. It can have a long-term meaning, and that is exactly what this has been."

Fraternity culture has been called into question in recent years on campuses across the country. Out-of-control hazing has turned fatal, incidents of sexual assaults and alleged druggings have mounted, and examples of racism, classism and other disturbing themes have come to the surface.

This group has tried to embody the inverse.

ZBT was founded in 1898, and despite being the world's first Jewish fraternity, the Beta Psi chapter welcomed people of all faiths and backgrounds. The chapter closed down and was later restored, and still operates at the school — though the current fraternity is not affiliated with the original members.

"I was the second African American in the group," said Chuck Hill, 76, who graduated in 1967. "I never felt alienated."

"The camaraderie that has developed over the years has been as strong as any that I've experienced in many of the military organizations that I've had the honor to serve in," said Hill, a retired Air Force pilot.

When one member's small bookstore in Lenox, Mass., was on the brink of bankruptcy, the fraternity — along with members of the local community — rallied to save it. The story became the subject of a documentary.

"When times come up that the group needs to support someone, there's no shying away," Hill said.

The brothers have also supported the community. Since 1998, they have maintained a scholar-ship fund and awarded a four-year partial scholarship to more than 20 university students based on financial need. Legacies of the fraternity are given priority, but the scholarship is also open to other students who meet their academic and financial requirements.

"All brothers contribute to whatever extent they can," said Howie Soltoff, a member of the fraternity who serves as a liaison with American University.

The group has funded educational programs elsewhere, too. When one brother, Harry Lehrer, died in 2004 at age 57, the brothers arranged an annual golf event in his memory. They have been raising funds for a school in Ecuador — where Lehrer's daughter worked as a teacher.

Additionally, the brothers have helped one another with serious personal matters over the years — including the loss of children and spouses, as well as health challenges, financial woes and legal issues.

"There have been many instances where I have helped and represented brothers and their family members confidentially, in matters of the most serious nature of one's life," said Ted Simon, 72, who graduated in 1971 and is a lawyer and former president of the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers. "I'm sure I'm not alone."

The brothers are an unusual bunch, Simon said, in part because they are different from one another in many ways.

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"This group, despite the vast political differences and divides, different social and cultural histories and experiences, significant age differences, and significant economic disparities, have remained a true band of brothers," Simon said. "I don't know people who have remained with a functioning group of this size for this long."

Simon created an email group 15 years ago that has helped keep the brothers in contact.

At the reunion, attendees reminisced and shared stories, including a classic tale in which Kanter chased a softball into Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson's front yard and was confronted by Secret Service officers. Johnson lived at the time in the Spring Valley neighborhood near the university.

David Aldridge, a former Washington Post writer and American University alumnus, presented Kanter with a softball that has Johnson's signature, as well as those of former AU president Hurst Anderson and Mickey Mantle, who was a famed New York Yankees player.

Participating in the reunion "was delightful," said Aldridge, who knows some of the fraternity brothers from the alumni community. When they asked if he would present the softball, "I was happy to do it."

"It's very touching that these guys are still together after all these decades," he added.

Following the campus event, the brothers spent the evening celebrating their friendship and dancing to The Van Dykes — a Baltimore rhythm and blues band that has played for the fraternity since the early 1960s.

Saturday's event was one of many gatherings the brothers have had since college, though the regular reunions didn't start until long after they left the university.

Ron Nissenbaum, 75, was one of the people who brought the group back together. It started in 1985, when Nissenbaum ran into a fraternity brother whom he had not seen since graduating in 1968.

As the two men caught up, Nissenbaum decided right that then he would organize a reunion. That year, ZBT held its first one, which drew close to 200 people.

The gathering was such a hit, Nissenbaum said, that not long after, "I started getting calls from the guys saying we want to have another one."

And so they did — and so began a tradition of gathering on a regular basis and being in frequent communication.

As the men moved through life, they have remained one another's go-to guys for issues large or small.


"There are people that have had hard times financially, and there are brothers that have anonymously supported them," said Simon, adding that several brothers contribute additional funds toward reunions to ensure everyone is able to attend.

Simon said this group is juxtaposition to the stories of "fraternity hazing, death and sexual abuse."

The brothers hope their bond sets an example for what a fraternity can and should be like.

"Some things change; some things never do and never will," Simon said.

Alumnus Endows Professorship in Art

"In art, there are an infinite number of answers to any one question. It's not linear," says Everett Anton "Tony" Singer (BA Art '70). Painting was his initial focus upon arriving at the University of Denver, but his interests broadened during his time here. Through classes in interior design, sculpture, painting, and more, he soon discovered an array of artistic talents that prepared him for a dynamic career.

Singer is investing in similarly broad and meaningful educational experiences for future students through a legacy gift establishing the Everett Anton Singer Endowed Professorship in Art in DU's College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

"An endowed professorship provides the funding to attract extraordinarily talented faculty to DU," says Singer. "In addition to becoming a magnet that draws students to DU, this artist-educator will have a monumental impact as they influence the next generation of painters."



"The Everett Anton Singer Endowed Professorship will allow the School of Art and Art History to bring in a painting professor with international prominence, raising the visibility of the program and giving our student artists mentorship of the highest level," says Annabeth Headrick, PhD, director of the School of Art and Art History. "In our painting studios, where students create art side-by-side with their professors, it's a game-changer to think of aspiring painters sharing ideas and techniques with a professor of this stature."

Professors help students discover a world that is far bigger than they realized when they first came to DU. In teaching young artists, professors challenge students to learn about themselves, discover new talents, and apply their creativity to unexpected facets of life. Funding for an endowed professorship, as through Singer's gift, breathes life into that process.

"Tony's visionary leadership in establishing this professorship will bring highly gifted artists to DU to teach our students, creating a tremendous impact for the University for many years to come," says Val Otten, senior vice chancellor. "We celebrate the difference that his gift will make for this program, ensuring a lasting presence of talented painters who will teach our students.

After graduating from DU and attending graduate school, Singer channeled his creative passions toward his family's printing business. Together with his half-brother, Singer transformed the mom-and-pop social printing business into one of the top three color printers in the New York metropolitan area, winning more awards on a dollar volume basis than any of their competitors.

Key to Singer's success was his artistic ability to envision an elevated product for his customers and help them achieve it. Because his DU education had expanded his understanding of his own artistic gift, he was able to use his skills to transform the family business.

Alongside a lifelong passion for art is Singer's indisputable love of automobiles. In the early 1980s, Singer was one of two photographers in the world who changed the way that automobiles are photographed. Instead of the traditional front, rear, and side views, Singer's photography showcased the car's shapes and curves: the beauty and functionality of a Ferrari's details that no one had captured before. His resulting book was the first to display such details using the 5-color printing process, a necessity in accurately portraying the Ferrari's signature blood red paint.

Since the 1980s, Singer's artistry in photography, painting, and printing has joined forces with his passion for automobiles in his company, https://www.VintageAutoPosters.com. He buys and sells vintage automotive posters worldwide, employing his artistic skill and knowledge of the field to connect people with pieces that bring them joy.

"Creativity is not one-dimensional," says Singer. "That's part of what I learned at DU. If you have talent and a creative eye, that will come out in many facets of your life and artistic pursuits."

John "Jack" Golbert 1940-2020 PHI SIGMA DELTA, Iota '62

A few days ago, I received a note from Nate Davidovich, '60, in Jerusalem. Am so saddened to learn of Jack Golbert's, '62, passing. Nate and Jack lived in the same Jerusalem community. I just heard from Jack a few weeks ago. Of course, there was no mention of his heart issues. As college men, we shared many adventures: being the first to move into the new chapter house, fraternity roommates, driving across the country for summer jobs at Bobbie Parker's Concord Hotel in the "Borscht Belt," having beers with him at his New York apartment. Jack lived with his family in Aurora, Colorado. After graduation from University of Denver, he moved to New York City to attend law school at NYU.
